




March 2024 Meeting at Dennis Hultay's S Scale Layout

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Poor Man's 1948 Hiawatha Project (Part 1)

I was certainly very happy when Walthers came out with the 1952 Hiawatha passenger cars and accompanying EMD E7 locomotives. That was probably the best business decision at the time because 1952 is when the Milwaukee Road added the Superdome car to the consist and the same cars could also be released later in Armor Yellow and Mist Gray Union Pacific scheme (that's a whole different story!).

But I always wanted to own the passenger car set that came out in 1948, Milwaukee's first departure from those rib-sided cars post war. It's basically the same cars as Walther's 1952 set, so I have been bugging those Walthers guys at the Big E for years to do the 1948 paint scheme. Why? It is simply the most beautiful paint scheme the Milwaukee ever came up with, but my requests to the Walthers guys fell on deaf

ears. Even when I pointed out they produced the Proto E6 No's 15a and 15b in that very paint scheme, they looked at me like I had two heads.

So rather than waiting, I decided to paint my own. But, I also decided to cheat a bit and not start from scratch and paint a bare plastic (or brass) unpainted model. I started from the Walthers 1952 model which looks like this:



This is one of my finished models with grabs attached, tinted windows and people in the Skytop lounge. Notice the paint scheme has a black roof and only one maroon band along the windows. The lettering above the windows is also maroon in color.

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Here is an old ad showing a variation of the Skytop (made by Pullman) in the 1948 color scheme:



The roof is a shade of light gray and an additional maroon band along the edge of the roof shows "The Milwaukee Road" in gold leaf lettering. These seem to be relatively minor but yet profound changes in the look of the train. First step in the conversion is disassembly. Use the Walthers instructions which show where the 4 or 5 roof tabs are located and use an X-acto No. 11 Chisel blade between the roof and the body. If you break

a tab, simply re-glue it with liquid cement (I use Tamiya). The glass section of the Skytop also snaps out by releasing tabs, leaving 3 sections:

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The next step is to mask 18 separate windows using a product called "Mr. Masking Sol – neo". I tested it on one window, then let it dry and made sure I could pull it up because most people I talk to say getting the liquid mask off is the hardest part. But not with this stuff, so I masked all the windows and taped off the rest:

Be sure and tape the inside to

avoid overspray on the glass. Also, notice I used liquid mask along the top of the marker light too. Next step is to paint the roof and the Skytop section gray. I was trying to match the same shade of gray as those Walthers Proto E6s, so that takes trial and error and the use of color swatches painted on white plastic. I found ½ Floquil CN gray plus ½ Floquil Reefer gray was a

pretty good match. Of course, Floquil is dead flat and I wanted a semi-gloss to match the locos. So after the Floquil was dry, I sprayed a coat of ½ Scale Coat Gloss and ½ Scale Coat Flat to give that semi-gloss finish I was looking for. Here is the result with liquid mask removed.





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The next step is to tape off that thin maroon stripe along the roof line. Now if this were a contest model I would never just paint over the maroon lettering but would likely sand it down. But remember, this is the Poor Man's 'Hi", so I figured the gold leaf lettering I will be applying will cover up any raised lettering. Notice I also cover the inside of the model so over spray doesn't get on the inside windows!




Like with the gray, I was trying to match the maroon color of the window band of the Walthers model. I found ½ Scale Coat LV Cornell red and ½ Scale Coat B&M Maroon, with just a "smidge" more of the LV red satisfactorily matched the Walthers color. These Scale Coat colors are high gloss, which is perfect for decaling. After drying, I applied MicroScale Gold Leaf lettering (psst, don't tell anyone, but

I used Milw. 1939 – 1946 decals. Why? Because that is what I had lying around!) After decaling, I sprayed Scale Coat flat.

I "tinted" my 1952 Hiawatha set with green windows. First, the actual train had tinted glass, and second, this hides the fact I did buy \$1000 worth of Preiser figures to fill my trains. But the Skytop section is just too cool to not show some passengers so those windows

remain clear. I use green radio control model airplane shrink plastic simply cut into strips that fit into the window recesses inside the car. If you cut them right, you don't even need glue to install. The next photo shows the clear green plastic cut to size and ready to install. The right side already has the tinting done. A few drops of canopy glue here and there does the trick.
