

Layout Visits Joint CNY- HBD Meeting 21 May 2022

Description: The layout depicts rural upstate NY with small towns and open spaces. The host scratch built many of the structures based on recollections from his childhood in Glens Falls and Hudson Falls. A nicely detailed and sceniced "proto freelance" layout inspired by the Delaware & Hudson's Lake George Branch in the fall of 1962. The branch interfaces with the main line at Junction Yard. Switching crews at Junction and Sonnyvale serve about a dozen local customers with their own spurs and many more via team tracks. The branch measures 45 ft. in length with a shorter branch serving an industrial area known as Fenimore. Switch lists for operating sessions are also prototypical and reflect the ebb and flow of day-to-day traffic. In nearly 200 operating sessions, no two days have ever been

alike. A custom-designed computer program uses Kip's collection of period Lake George Branch switch lists and each crew's switch lists appear as they did 60 years ago, adding to each operating session's authentic feel. The layout is built upon traditional L-girders topped with plywood and sheet foam. The S2, S4, RS2, RS3, and RS11 locomotives feature ESU sound. The layout is featured in "Great Model Railroads 2011" and "Railroad Model Craftsman," April 2013 gracing the covers of each magazine.

Access: Entry is via the front door, and then down a flight of stairs to the basement. Entry into the layout is walk-in.

Description: The New York & Long Branch Railroad is loosely based on the prototype which connected the industrial north to the Jersey Shore. The railroad is operated by both the Central Railroad of New Jersey and Pennsylvania. It is set around 1957 and has an interchange with the Lehigh Valley in Perth Amboy and the Raritan River at South Amboy. The layout is 21' x 34' with a second level and additional 8' x 12' staging area. Motive power includes steam, diesel, and some electric under catenary. MRC Prodigy Advance DCC system is used for control, with 8 throttles used by operators during monthly operating sessions. The host is masterful at capturing the essence and feel of scenic locations along the New York and Long Branch

Railroad from the busy passenger operations in downtown Newark to the salt marshes along the Jersey coast, to the highly industrialized areas around Perth Amboy and South Amboy, and to the small-town destinations of Atlantic Highlands and Red Bank. There are numerous award-winning scratch-built structures throughout the layout. This layout is featured in November 2013 "Model Railroader."

Access: Entry is via the side door into the house, then down 5 steps to the basement. Entry into the layout is walk-in.

Description: The Great Northern Railroad Kalispell Division represents a double track main from Whitefish, Montana to Great Falls, Montana via Shelby, Montana. The railroad passes through Columbia Falls and along the Southern border of Glacier National Park including Belton, Essex, and Summit, before reaching Shelby. There is also a branch line from Columbia Falls to the town of Kalispell. The railroad features named freight and passenger trains, along with local freights. There are 3 yards. A large yard located at Whitefish with engine facilities, a small yard at Kalispell and staging yard at Shelby. The layout operates point-to-point

and uses switch lists. Benchwork and backdrops are completed with 50% scenery completed. The railroad captures the beautiful Rockies with a careful blending of foreground scenery, photo backdrops, and wonderful clouds, highlighted by the rugged 2% climb over the Marias Pass, which requires the addition of helper engines. A featured structure is the scratch built, award winning Whitefish station.

Access: Entry into the house is two steps up, and then down a flight of stairs to the basement. Entry into the layout is walk-in.

Description: Rich has two layouts. The City of Wauwatoga is a play on words between the host's hometown just west of Milwaukee, named Wauwatosa, and the city where he resides today, Saratoga Springs. This terminal-style layout models the Milwaukee Road in a fictional city with a passenger station, a yard, an engine terminal, icing station, and plenty of local industries. Wauwatoga is also the terminus of a branch line from the town of Viroqua. Points east and west are represented by hidden staging, as is the Viroqua branch. Local industries include the Derby Meat Packing Company, Tischbein Furniture, Quickflash Oil Company, the Wauwatoga Freight House, Klein-

Heinz Dairy, Piggly Wiggly Wholesale Grocers and more. The layout was originally wired for DC cab control but has been configured running DCC. While visiting Wauwatoga, you can also view progress on the host's dream layout under construction, Milwaukee Road's Lacrosse and River Division, First District, 2nd Sub-Division in the mid 1950s. Many of the buildings have been scratch built. The City of Wauwatoga layout is featured in "Model Railroader," December 2006.

Access: Entry is via the side door next to the garage (ring bell), then down a flight of stairs to the basement.

Description: Inspired by Miniatur Wunderland in Hamburg, Germany Diamond Point Railways is three separate but interconnected railways: United States (HO), Germany (HO), and England (OO). The overall layout room size is 18 X 25 feet, with 2 X 16-foot staging yard underneath Germany reached by helices at each end. The layout features steam, early diesel, and electric locos, most with sound decoders. The mainline runs are USA 45', Germany 60', England 30', and around the room 75'. The minimum track radius is 18", and the maximum grade is 2.5%. Code 100 track is used with manual and Tortoise throws. The trackwork and scenery are 100% complete. The structures and mostly kit built, plastic and (very realistic) card. A key feature of the layout is the large amount of animation in all three countries. Also, there are cities, small towns, roundhouses, and turntables in all three countries, plus a lot of interesting rolling stock. The layouts are certainly not prototypical, but rather reflect the host's images and feelings of each country. However, all the buildings and motor vehicles in Germany, for example, are authentic German, and the same is true for the US and England.

Access: Entry into the house is from the side door facing the driveway, then one step down to the finished house entrance, through an unfinished utility room, then two more steps down to the finished train room in the finished basement. The unfinished utility room has a low ceiling in some places. Watch your heads until you get to the clothes washer and dryer!
