

The family recently got back from a long-planned trip to Toronto to attend the "Great British Train Show". As the name might imply, the theme was railways in the UK and this included everything from who sponsored it (Rapido Trains UK), the types of layouts that were operated, the goods that were being sold by the vendors, and the educational literature and displays that were out. In fact, the only break in tradition was the "Shining Time Station" display.



Since it had morphed into a full-family trip, we decided to do some other things too, like go to the Zoo (which had a train-like ride) and the Aquarium (which was literally across the street from the Toronto Railway Museum). Unfortunately, on the drive to Canada I realized I left my camera at home (oops!) but my wife graciously offered to take lots of pictures on her cell phone.

When we got to the show on Saturday morning (well, we actually got there Friday morning and over an hour early but discovered I had written down the wrong day for the show!) I was overwhelmed with the

things to see. An entire ice rink was filled with displays, layouts, and vendors and I didn't know where to start. So I let Harrison take the lead and we went to the layouts featuring the most movement. We didn't get more than 10 feet in when he spotted Toby and Henry pulling trains on a large Gauge 1 layout based on the Island of Sodor. As we were walking around Harrison let out a loud cheer at the sight of Thomas, and I could the layout's owner say "Now that's what this is all



about!" And he was right.

I got started on Thomas the Tank Engine in 1989 when Shining Time Station was broadcast on PBS. My son thinks he loves Thomas, but in reality we both do. Some things from childhood never leave you. They had a nice display of S.T.S. stuff from a guy named Adrian who has a podcast and managed to get many of the surviving cast members on it for a reunion show. He also had actual props from the show on display, which was really neat. This was probably the highlight of the trip for me.

We saw layouts in N scale, OO scale, O scale, and various other scale/gauge combinations including 1:16 scale "live steam" trains that the owner just pushed around in his house because his wife wouldn't let him dig up their garden for a line.



One interesting discovery was the operating Hornby Dublo layout and

Trix Twin Railway layouts, which looked like OO gauge trains running on three-rail track similar to Lionel trains. By having two different transformers feeding opposite outside rails, and by having a pair of engines only picking up current from one outside rail, primitive two train control was possible. They ran making lots of noise but it was great fun.



By far the most interesting layout on display was O scale narrow gauge (what we call On30) modeling India's Darjeeling and Himalayan Railway. Having only seen a couple of models of these trains in larger scales before, and never set in a proper layout featuring Indian scenery and structures, it was fascinating to watch. Nearly everything had to be scratch built.

I wish I had spent all day at the show but we had other things to do as well. But, I definitely hope to get back in two years and will plan to spend a lot more time taking it all in.

certainly possible. The layout features basic scenery including a quarry scene and some trees, but all of the structures are removed and no trains come with the layout. This layout is available to anyone who would be interested in it.

Also, Joe built a set of HO

modules that demonstrated working railroad safety signals. It is in good condition but some minor repair may be needed to some of the signals.



## Poor Man's 1948 Hiawatha Project (Part 2)

I "tinted" my 1952 Hiawatha set with green windows. First, the actual train had tinted glass, and second, this hides the fact I didn't buy \$1000 worth of Preiser figures to fill my trains. But the Skytop section is just too cool to not show some passengers so those windows remain clear. I use green radio control model airplane shrink plastic simply cut into strips that fit into the window recesses

inside the car. If you cut them right, you don't even need glue to install. The next photo shows the clear green plastic cut to size and ready to install. The right side already has the tinting done. A few drops of canopy glue here and there does the trick.

I decided to paint the bland cream-colored plastic seats and floor in the Skytop using colors I've seen in photos. I add some passengers, a waiter, newspapers, and beer bottles for interest. Notice the new maroon band changes to gray just before the Skytop section. This gray had been painted black for the 1952 scheme but is actually gray for the 1948 scheme. I simply masked off this section and brush painted the gray after saving some of the mixed gray paint for this and later touch-up.



Final assembly and finishing touches is really the most fun part! I added all the grab irons that came with the Walthers model (well

most), installed an MV Products 0.18" diameter red lens for the rear beacon, and 3 window wipers made by Detail Associates. I

painted the grabs, the marker lights and did some minor gray touch-up on the Skytop here and there. Here are some pics of the final result.

My Poor Man's 1948 Hiawatha project is well underway. This next photo shows the Walthers Proto E6s I acquired that inspired the project in the first place.

I have finished a baggage/express car, two coaches, and the Skytop lounge car. An RPO and parlor car are almost done, I have acquired a tap lounge, and am bidding on Ebay for a cheap diner (at \$43 today). No car was over \$50. These cars in brass by

Shoreham Shops or other manufacturers cost easily \$400 to \$500 factory painted. The Walthers cars are decent replicas, roll freely and best of all, are painted. My small change creates an entirely different look to this classic consist and I am not sure, but I

don't remember many modelers taking a painted model and modifying it to make an all-new model (compare first photo to new paint scheme), so maybe this gives you some ideas, too.

#### O Scale Track Available to Members

The Division was given a generous donation of several boxes of used O scale, three-rail Lionel style tubular track. There are an estimated 40 pieces of standard straight track, 30 pieces of standard curved track, and around a dozen of the large-radius curved track pieces. There are also about a
